Becoming a Secondary Education Teacher

The Secondary Teacher Preparation Program at Michigan State University emphasizes the preparation of justice-oriented professionals who are ready to teach on Day 1. You will develop deep content knowledge in the subject(s) you plan to teach in seventh through twelfth grade (7-12), take courses on the most effective teaching practices that support equitable learning for all adolescents, and experience a guided teaching internship in a public school.

Commitment to justice-oriented teaching

We are guided by our belief that education empowers adolescents to make the world a more just place. Our program starts with social justice coursework and that focus on supporting all learners to be critical and creative actors is sustained throughout.

Commitment to rich content

We are guided by research about the critical role of expert subject matter knowledge in quality teaching. Teachers who know the content well have students who learn more. These teachers know how students learn—what they struggle with, what they are likely to misunderstand, what questions they are likely to have. They possess the knowledge and skills for designing instruction to capitalize on the ways learners learn particular content.

Learning by doing

The student teaching internship is the capstone of MSU's Secondary Teacher Preparation Program. You will work with a committed mentor teacher who will be there to guide you every step of the way. We place interns in our partner school districts in the Lansing area, Grand Rapids area, and Southeast Michigan.

WHAT DOES THE SENIOR YEAR INTERNSHIP LOOK LIKE?

The Secondary Education Internship Experience

Secondary education students will complete an immersive student teaching internship experience across their entire senior year. Interns are assigned to one classroom and mentor teacher and will take on increased responsibilities throughout the year. Students will follow their placement school's calendar.

Fall Schedule

- Placement begins full-time in mid-August when school district starts before MSU classes start in late August
- Attend internship placement one day per week during MSU semester as determined by the internship course
- After finals, attend full-time until school district goes on winter break

Spring Schedule

- Return to placement full-time in January when district starts, prior to the start of MSU semester
- Placement is full-time five days per week throughout semester
- Attend online seminar one hour per week in evenings and four on-campus professional development days throughout the semester
- Spring break will align with school's break (not MSU)
- The internship will conclude at the end of MSU's finals week

MICHIGAN TEST FOR TEACHER CERTIFICATION (MTTC)

Taking and passing MTTC tests prior to the completion of the internship in teaching major, teaching minor endorsement (if applicable), and professional knowledge and skills is an important step to receive your Michigan standard (initial) teaching license. Additional oral proficiency testing is required for world language students. Check with teacher prep advisors for study materials available to help with preparation.

COHORT PROGRAMS

URBAN EDUCATORS COHORT PROGRAM (UECP)

What is UECP?

The <u>Urban Educators Cohort Program (UECP)</u> gives students a distinct perspective on teaching in communities where resources and services are often limited. This cohort offers small group focused coursework, specialized engagement experiences, and an urban internship to help prepare members for a career as an equity and justice focused educator.

What do urban educators do?

- Appreciate sociocultural issues
- Understand structures of power, privilege, & poverty
- Embrace cross cultural differences
- Create inclusive learning environments
- Connect with families & communities

What is GECP?

The Global Educators Cohort Program (GECP) prepares future teachers committed to preparing today's children for tomorrow's world. GECP gives a group of future educators the tools needed to teach with a global view and to make an impact in culturally diverse classrooms. Through small-group focused coursework and participation in global experiences and events, MSU's Global Educators are prepared to help young people think about themselves as citizens and stewards of the world around them.
